# REALIZING GOD

OD'S MESSENGERS
have constantly stated that until you accept the shelter of a Perfect Master, you will not be able to unite with God, who is also known by numerous names. All humanity was created through His glory.

They explain that those of us who have forgotten God will have to endure the suffering of hell, which exists in the form of suffering that confronts man in his lifetime. Most of us believe that the time for remembering God is when you are old, which unfortunately is not the case. Remembering God is not dictated by age.

It is a fact that God can be remembered in an instant, but I have mentioned on many occasions that reciting His name can only be achieved if it is willed by God Himself. If you truly wish to remember Him then you must accept a Perfect Master's shelter and attain His Naam, the Word.

Some people despite having received Naam and performing service question their validity. They still yearn for something that will bring them happiness and peace of mind.

Naam can only be recited when certain principles are also accepted. Firstly, I have explained that Naam can only be recited if you are blessed by your Master or God. But where the Will is concerned, there are no principles because whosoever accepts the Will of God and practises and obeys his Master to the letter, will surely attain happiness, peace of mind and release from the cycle of life and death.

There are four forms of service. The first one is verbal whereby you recite His Naam. The second form is physical whereby you render manual service, doing whatever manual work is required. Third is in the form of finance, whereby you

offer donations to be used for the good of the congregation and those less fortunate than yourself. Finally, there is the service of the mind, where you offer your mind to the Master and accept His Naam.

Although there are four forms of service, any one of them could be acceptable to your Master.

#### STAGES OF NAAM

One question that is constantly asked is how do we recite Naam. The first stage of reciting Naam is through verbal repetition. The second stage is achieved when the sound is accepted by the larynx and verbal repetition becomes redundant. The third stage is achieved when the sound becomes part of your heartbeat. Lastly, the sound becomes the essence of your being and is repeated with every breath you take. This is the final stage, one of union with God.

A true follower is one who relinquishes his pride. He will not be worried by what the world will say about him. But at the same time if you do not love your Master's followers then how will the Master love you. If you wish to follow a Master then you must first love His congregation.

If people are unwilling to love their fellow members, what benefit will they attain? To those people I have only one thing to say: They should forget this place altogether. This place belongs to those who follow all the rules and regulations of the institution and its Master.

A dharam (religion) is true if you can achieve happiness and peace of mind from it. Whether it is Hinduism, Christianity, Islam, Sikhism or Humanitarianism.

I have told you before, I make no promises that after death you will attain anything. But what I have earnestly stated is that you should unite with God while you exist in a human body. This time and space is important and one from which you can benefit. Go to a Perfect Master and attain the treasure of Naam. Follow the true path, which is not for the faint-hearted, but for the brave because it is an extremely difficult path to follow.

You do not pursue what will really benefit you, but instead follow the path chosen by your mind. The mind is a follower of vice and creates a divide between your soul and God. Do not follow the mind because it is an enemy against whom you should defend yourself. Follow not your mind, but the voice of your soul, which for centuries has been separated from God.


They walk in humility, speak gently, give generously and pray for the welfare of all humanity. They will not divulge to anyone your deeds. These are the virtues of a Master. If He is endowed with these qualities, then we should endeavour to attain them also. If you cannot become like the Master, then at least accept His principles.

You have never been directed to leave your employment, relatives, friends or worldly affairs. You are free to go anywhere you wish. If a Master has to fulfil all worldly affairs and responsibilities, then surely you must also fulfil yours. One directive I do affirm is that you should honour and form a true relationship, not a false one with your Master.

You are indeed fortunate to have been blessed with life. You have a responsibility to stand up against all injustice.

## THE SOUL'S PHYSICAL HOME

HEN GOD ordains that a soul be incarnated in human form its first home will be in a foetus in the pre-natal cocoon of its physical mother. Until its physical birth as a baby and subsequent growth into adulthood, or a stage when it can fend for itself, its physical welfare will be dependent on its designated parent(s), guardian(s) or itself (in extreme cases). Either way, whatever stage the incarnated soul is at in its physical home, its well-being can only be catered for with proper nourishment until its allotted time on earth has run out and its physical home is no longer of any use to it, thereby leaving it no alternative, but to vacate it and return to its natural home in the spirit world.

The greatest thing that the host parent can do for the embryo is to be physically fit so that the foetus can develop a strong home, its body, for its physical birth and for

its life. If that is achieved the new born baby will inherit a formidable constitution on which whoever rears it can build on.

The baby's physical future will largely depend on the diet it is given during its formative years. With a well-balanced diet and proper exercise the soul in a human body should exist trouble-free throughout its life-span, barring accidents or the intake of impure substances. The absence of a good diet and exercise will render the body weak, frail and 'diseased'. It will be unable to defend itself against the invasion of infections. The condition of the human body can determine its physical appearance which, in turn, can affect its mental attitude.

Access to a well-balanced diet and proper exercise will keep the body fit and healthy. The shape will be in proportion to its height while its density and weight will be partly dependent on its chassis, frame or skeleton. By adding or deducting either diet or exercise or both, the body can be brought to various peaks of performance and size according to the individual's preference. Its stature will be proud, upright, strong and full of

energy.

The lack of either a well-balanced diet or exercise or both, can result in the opposite in that the body will be unfit and unhealthy. The shape will be disproportionate to its height and its density and weight will be either over or under (fat or thin) and therefore would not appear suitable on the skeleton. Its stature maybe bent, weak and lacking energy.

The body's physical appearance is changeable and the degree of alteration will largely depend on a person's disposition. If we are satisfied with our physical home we may be able to find it eas-

ier to attain peace of mind while coping with our earth-bound labours that destiny has mapped-out for each and everyone of us.

## A WORLD CREED?

espite negative and hostile media coverage there is an unprecedented rate of conversion to Islam in Britain. What is ironic is that most converts are women, notwithstanding the widely held belief that Islam treats women as second-class citizens.

The rapid rate of conversion is prompting speculation that Islam will become an important religious force in Britain. It is estimated that in the next 20 years the number of British converts will be greater than or at least equal to the immigrant Muslim community. At present the Muslim community numbers about 1.5 million. The figure includes about 20,000 new con-

There are various reasons for women converting to Islam in this country:

Most converts are former Christians who are attracted to the discipline and security of Islam. They are mainly disillusioned by the deep crisis within the Anglican and Catholic Churches and despair at the gradual decay of their own society, caused by a rise in crime, family breakdown, drugs and alcoholism. Others have found an appeal in Sufi mysticism or converted through marriage.

The majority of converts come from middleclass backgrounds and are usually well educated. This accentuates the intellectual appeal of Islam.

The formal initiation into Islam is relatively simple. The prospective convert bathes, dons clean garments and recites the shahada, the testimony to God, in the presence of witnesses.

However, life as a Muslim can prove to be problematic for most new converts. They are often rejected by their families and friends and are perceived as being unpatriotic or even traitors to their own sex, in the case of women.

The term 'Muslim women' brings to mind images of women who are slaves to men and desperate to be westernized.

Muslim women challenge such stereotypes and are anxious to distinguish between genuine Islamic values and cultural behaviour. They claim that the oppression of women is a political and not religious issue.

Female converts are quick to point out numerous verses in the Koran that support women's rights and lament about the few that seemingly do not. They feel that the more orthodox believers cling to these few without any regard for the rest.

Those accused of betraying their own sex compare the status of women in Islam with what they see as an identity crisis:

Women in the west try to copy men in an effort to be equal and thus, from a Muslim woman's viewpoint, womanhood has no basic value.

Whatever the reasons for conversion, Islam seems to have finally shed its image as a purely eastern religion and is winning over converts in the western world which has always viewed it with suspicion and hostility.

> One boy remained where he was, leaning against the tree with his hands in his pockets in apparent disinterest.


> "Why are you not trying to claim this sixpence?" asked the passer-by.

Egg-Free Vegetarian Cookery for All

**VEGETABLE DAL** 

#### **Ingredients**

50 grams whole moong dal [soak in water for 2 hours]

100 grams of tomatoes, finely chopped

1 bunch of spinach leaves, finely chopped

1/4 bunch fenugreek leaves, finely chopped

2 potatoes, chopped

1/2 aubergine, chopped

5 okra, chopped

1 tablespoon of ghee

1 onion, finely chopped

1/4 tablespoon turmeric

1/4 tablespoon cumin seeds and pepper

1/2 tablespoon red chilli powder

2 carrots, grated

3 stalks of cabbage leaves, finely chopped

#### Grind to paste

4 green chillies, 1 piece of ginger, 2 pieces of cinnamon, 3 cloves of garlic, 1/2 tablespoon cumin seeds roasted, 1/4 cup mint leaves, 3 cardamoms, 3 cloves, 5 peppercorns & 1/2 cup coriander leaves.

#### Method

1) Remove the husks of moong dal. Add 2 cups of water in pressure cooker. Add dal, vegetables, spinach and fenugreek leaves. Cook. Cool, mash and strain the mixture in a collander.

2) Heat ghee in a vessel. To it add cumin seeds and saute the onions for five minutes. Add tomatoes and stir for five minutes. Add ground paste, chilli powder, turmeric, salt and grated carrots. Add the strained dal. Boil for five minutes.

sions and forgot God. Through wrong actions, you continually weave circles which will eventually entangle you and cause you suffering. I am not encouraging you to set aside your responsibilities, but am emphasizing that you detach yourself from them. Be like a swan that leaves the pond with dry wings. Do not sink in your responsibilities.

#### WAKE UP

The human body is the true abode of God and is recognized as the highest form. He blessed it with so much love that whenever God comes on earth, He takes the form of man. You are asleep despite being awake. Wake up and cleanse your body.

Only a Perfect Master can take us across this impasse. A Perfect Master is one who is truly fulfilled and can be beckoned at any time. He protects you and is with you always. In His shelter you should accept His Will. Without seeking anything in return, He assists you and is at one with God.

The body is not the Perfect Master. His Naam is the Perfect Master. That which you recite, whose presence and features are forever etched on your mind, heart and soul. Your very being rejoices at the sight of Him [Naam].
